# **DVAR TORAH**

## Two Battlefronts, One Strategy

The following story was printed in the London Jewish Chronicle on February 13, 1885: It is recorded in the history of the Crimean War. During the battle of Redan on Sevastopol (a Russian port city on the Black Sea), an English officer who was leading one of the attacking parties, had a musket leveled at him by a Russian officer hiding behind one of the fortifications. The Russian officer was about to pull the trigger when the English officer made an exclamation. Another Russian officer who happened to hear it, struck the musket aside and grasping the hand of the English officer said, "He is my brother." and pulled him behind the Russian lines, thus saving his life.

We find multiple examples of such stories occurring during World War One, and during various battles the Israeli army had with its enemies, where Jewish soldiers were miraculously saved after yelling "Shema Yisroel' moments before they thought they were about to die. The source for this would seem to be in this week's Parsha. When detailing the preparations for battle, the *Passuk* (20, 2-3) states, "The Kohen shall approach and he shall speak to the people... "Shema Yisroel", today you are coming near to the battle against your enemies..." Rashi commenting on the words "Shema Yisroel" quotes a Gemarah in Sota (42a) which says, "Even if there is no merit in you but the recitation of Shema alone, you are worthy that He should save you." Although the Gemara in Sota says clearly that it is the merit of constant recital of Krias Shema morning and night which saves them, R'Shlomo Zalman Aurebach posits that the simple saying of Shema Yisroel alone would be enough. He bases it on what we recite on almost a daily basis in the Tachanun "Shomer Yisroel [Guardian of Israel] protects the remnant of Israel... those who declare "Shema Yisroel."

This concept also exists in regard to spiritual battles. One of the solutions given by the *Gemara* in *Berachos* (5a) to one who is faced with extreme temptations by his *Yetzer Horah* is to recite *Shema*. What is it about recit-

ing Krias Shema that brings about such miraculous results?

The answer can be found in the Maharal, in his commentary Gur Aryeh, in this week's Parsha. The Maharal explains that the reason why saying Shema Yisroel brings about victory, is because when doing so one is expressing his firm belief in the Oneness of Hashem, he is recognizing that the only reality in the world is G-d, "Ain Od Milvado." A person who lives with that belief puts himself in the "camp" of G-d, a world where the clear reality is that nothing can exist in opposition to Him. Therefore both physically and spiritually one achieves salvation from any impending danger. All physical or spiritual impediments fade away, for they only exist for the express purpose of bringing one closer to Hashem. It is important at this time of year to contemplate this, for as Rabbi Eliyahu Dessler writes, we are either heading towards Hashem or away, there is no middle ground. Your mindset depends on you. May we receive Divine Assistance to direct our thoughts in the right direction and may this Elul be a meaningful one.

### The Laws of Tefillas Haderech

Adapted from the *shiurim* of *Rabbi Yochanan Eskenazi* 

The source for *Tefillas Haderech* is a Gemara Brachos (29b) which states: "Eliyahu Hanavi told Rabbi Yehuda the brother of Rav Salla Chasida... and when you set out on the way beg leave of your King and then set out." The Gemara [ibid] explains that this means one is required to recite *Tefillas Haderech* when one travels.

The obligation to recite *Tefillas Haderech* occurs whether one is traveling by foot or any other mode of transportation. (Mishna Berura 110:30) Even if one travels the exact route each day he is obligated say *Tefillas Haderech* each time. (Emes L'Yaakov OC 110:ftnt. 139) Additionally, one has to travel a distance of a *Parsa* [8000 *amos*] (Shulchan Aruch 110:7)

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which practically speaking is approximately 3 miles. (Halachically Speaking 1:pg. 75 quoting Rabbi Belsky shlit"a) The Poskim disagree whether it is the actual distance that brings about the requirement, or the time it takes to travel a *parsa*, which is approximately 72 minutes. The minhag of Bnei Ashkenaz is to base it on the distance [3 miles]. (Halachically Speaking 1:pg. 75 quoting Rabbi Belsky shlit"a and Reb Y.S. Eliyashiv zt"l) The Bnei Sefard, on the other hand, follow the custom that it is the time of 72 minutes which creates the obligation. (Shu"T Yabe'ah Omer 1:13)] However, if one is travel-



ling in a dangerous place (even if he will be travelling less than a parsa), one is required to recite *Tefillas Haderech* with a *Brachah*. (MB 110:30) This is because the reason why the full text [with the *Brachah*] is only obligated when there is above stated requirements is because less than that is considered a "short trip" and it is uncommon to encounter any danger in such a short distance, if there is a known danger then the obligation would certainly apply. (Mishna Berura 110:30) To be continued next week.
